

What is Journeys Home

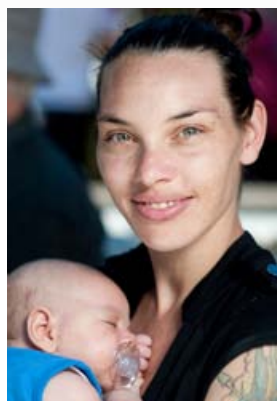


Journeys Home is an important study that includes a national face-to-face survey to collect information about the living and housing challenges that people may be facing.

The survey is managed by the Melbourne Institute of Applied Economic and Social Research at the University of Melbourne, on behalf of the Australian Government Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA).

This project has been approved by the University of Melbourne's Human Research Ethics Committee. Information provided by survey participants will be handled in strict confidence and will be used for research purposes only.

Data analysis and reporting will not identify individual respondents.

Longitudinal Study of Factors Affecting Housing Stability

What is the survey about?

The survey is about the living and housing challenges that people may be facing. The results of the survey will be used by researchers, service providers, and government agencies to better understand the issues surrounding needs and experiences of Australians in the field of housing. This evidence will be used to design early intervention and prevention strategies for people who face these challenges.



How is information collected?

The Melbourne Institute and Australian Government Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA) have contracted Roy Morgan Research to collect information for this study largely through face to face interviews, although some interviews may be conducted by telephone. An interviewer will contact you between 1 September and 30 November, 2011 to participate in the survey. Interviews can be arranged at a time and place to suit you.

What will I be asked to do?

If you agree to participate, a face-to-face interview will be conducted at a time and location convenient to you. In this interview, you will be asked about your general and family background, housing and living arrangements, education, employment, income, relationships, and health. There are also questions about living challenges that some people may have encountered, such as drug use or violence.

You are not required to answer any questions you do not wish to. The information you provide is completely confidential. Neither your answers to the survey questions nor your non-participation in the survey will impact on your Centrelink payments.

How was I selected?

People have been randomly selected from Centrelink records.



How long will it take?

The interview will take approximately 50 minutes to complete depending on your answers. You can stop the interview at any point and have the option to resume the interview at a later date. (We would also like you to participate in this study in the future to find out how you are going. Future interviews will be shorter and only take approximately 40 minutes.)

Is there any payment for participating?

We greatly appreciate you taking the time to participate in this important survey. In recognition of this, all participants will be paid \$40 each time we interview you. If interviewed in person this will be paid to you at the time of interview.

How will my privacy be protected?

All information collected will be kept strictly confidential (except where it is required to be reported by law and/or



there is a risk of harm to yourself or others). Your contact details will be removed before your survey information is passed on to the researchers at the Melbourne Institute.

This research is being carried out in compliance with the *Privacy Act 1988* and the information will only be used for research purposes.

Is participation voluntary?

Participation in this survey is entirely voluntary and you are free to withdraw from the survey at any time. Should you wish to withdraw your data from the survey you may contact Roy Morgan Research and your information will be destroyed.
