Summary

He leads the Melbourne Institute’s “Financial Wellbeing” research team and attracts industry funding. He has published in many top ranking journals including *American Economic Review*, *Review of Economics and Statistics*, *Journal of Human Resources*, *Journal of Economic Behavior & Organization*, *Economic Journal*, *Journal of Health Economics*, *Social Science and Medicine*, *Journal of Population Economics* and *Labour Economics*.

He has attracted highly competitive Australian Research Council grant funds. He has over 10 years of teaching experience at Bachelor, Master and PhD level and taught full 3 hour/week classes from 3 to 1,000 students.
